# **EJNI Launch**

On Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> June, the 21<sup>st</sup> Anniversary of the Aarhus Convention, the Environmental Justice Network Ireland (EJNI) was launched in the Ulster Museum, Belfast.

We were overwhelmed by the interest in the network and by the range of stakeholders who travelled to attend its launch. Academics, environmental campaigners, NGOs, the media, members of the legal profession, representatives from local and central government as well as politicians from across the political spectrum and from both sides of the border in Ireland travelled to attend the launch. A film documenting the event is available <u>here</u>.

Dr Ciara Brennan from Newcastle Law School explained the key drivers behind the establishment of EJNI, focusing on the rise of grassroots environmental campaigning, unease about the impact Brexit may have on environmental protection on the island of Ireland and the need to enhance collaboration between environmental stakeholders and across the Irish border. She also highlighted the need to develop evidencebased directions for reform and design transdisciplinary academic research agendas that reflect the needs of different stakeholder groups. With the help of our IT Support team, Ciara then demonstrated the features of the EJNI website (ejni.net) and explained to delegates how they could contribute to the project. Finally, Ciara highlighted EJNI's plans to hold its next seminar in November 2019. Dr Peter Doran from Queen's University Belfast then presented delegates with a history of movementbuilding around the concept of environmental justice, before introducing our keynote speaker, <u>Dr Andrew</u> <u>Jackson</u> of University College Dublin. Andrew gave an inspirational speech covering the nature of the climate emergency, the emergence of strategic environmental litigation (in particular his experience with <u>Climate Case</u> <u>Ireland</u>) and the role of the Aarhus Convention in liberalising access to environmental justice in Ireland. In his opinion, 'the Environmental Justice Network looks set to play a vital contribution to the public discourse around urgent, ambitious environmental action, and at just the right time'. Andrew's full speech is now available to watch <u>here</u>.

Our speeches concluded with a rousing analysis of the challenges facing environmental justice campaigners in Ireland today from <u>Dean Blackwood</u>, comments from the audience and <u>James Orr</u> from Friends of the Earth NI highlighting the importance of the new network in helping to 'advance environmental justice for a peaceful society, a healthier democracy, the rights of nature and a sustainable economy'. We thank everyone who attended and contributed to the launch event and look forward to working with you all in the future.

A key goal of the EJNI website is to act as a collaborative resource for a wide range of environmental stakeholders. We hope this resource will help fill exsiting gaps in knowledge about the different roles that individuals, organisations and government bodies are playing in the pursuit of environmnental justice objectives. The website has a number of sections to which stakeholders can contribute.

Our 'People' page provides a platform for individuals and organisations to present a profile of their work. For academics this can include a bibliography of relevant resources as well as full-text versions of publications, blogs and reports. It can also include links to personal research web pages at academic insitutions. For legal professionals this can include profiles of interests, details of availability, previous experience, pro bono work and contact details. For scrutiny bodies, the profile can contain details of ongoing investigations and past reports. For NGOs, summaries of past and ongoing campaigns and projects, as well as consultation responses and newsletters can be featured. For bodies, government policies, consultation and public engagement excercises can be featured as well as links to press releases about government-led initiatives. environmental reporting or successes.

The '<u>Stories</u>' page will centre around an interactive map which will provide details of environmental justice campaigns across the island of ireland. We encourage campaigners and local groups to submit their testimonies and photos, regardless of the utimate success of the campaign. Once developed, this feature of the website will act as an archive and history of environmental justice environmental campaigning on the island of Ireland.

The 'Resources' section of the website is organised thematically. This is intended to act as a research resource both for any stakeholder groups with interests in these areas. We currently have six thematic areas: environmental extractivism. governance, nature. rights of nature/rights of communities. intensive farming and legal process. We welcome suggestions for both new thematic areas and for resources to add to existing themes.

The 'Events' section will contain detals about past and future EJNI events, including pictures, videos and documents where appropriate. Stakeholders can also submit details of events which may be of wider interest to website users to feature on both the website and in the newsletter. We plan to develop a Calender function as details of more events are submitted.

Current projects seeking participants include: Stakeholder Evaluation of Planning Survey

A team of researchers from Queen's University Belfast and Cardiff University have launched a major survey that seeks to capture what a wide range of stakeholders think about the planning systems of N Ireland, Rep of Ireland & Wales. The research is designed to not only contribute to the development of academic research into planning theory and evaluation, but also to directly inform the discussion, design and delivery of planning policy and the governance, resourcing and regulation of development. A report of the findings will be freely available in early 2020.
